Kurotani Washi Kaikan Hall: Visit a Japanese paper studio and meet Japanese Kurotani washi paper craftsmen. You will actually experience making Japanese paper at the studio.

Gunze Memorial Hall: The hall shows the history of Gunze, a textile manufacturer that started out producing raw silk, a local industry of Ayabe.

Fukuchiyama Castle: The castle was built by the warlord Akechi Mitsuhide. We will look at the castle from the outside due to constructions.

Japanese Oni Exchange Museum: Oe-cho in Fukuchiyama is famous for legends of oni demons. This museum features an exhibition of artifacts relating to oni demons collected from Japan and abroad.

Three Motoise Shrines: The tour will visit Naiku Kotai Shrine and Amano Iwato Shrine, two of the three Motoise Shrines that are associated with Ise Grand Shrine, and feature an impressive, mysterious and sacred atmosphere.
